Discharge Instructions for Baby – HIV Prevention



Medication Information:

- This medicine will help prevent baby from getting HIV
 - Baby will be on zidovudine (AZT) and possibly nevirapine and lamivudine
 - Baby must get medication(s), do not miss any doses
 - Make sure you know correct dose before you leave hospital
- You will be sent home with all medications and syringes needed
 - Hospital staff will assist in ensuring nevirapine medication is available for baby.
- Never mix medication in formula. If baby does not drink all the formula, then they will not get all the medicine.
- Give medicine to baby before or during a feeding:
 - Use a syringe to draw up the amount of medicine you need to give baby
 - Put the syringe in baby's mouth, just inside the cheek
 - With 4 to 5 gentle pushes on the plunger give the medicine
 - o If baby does not feed when medicine should be given, still give the medicine on time
 - o You can also use a bottle nipple instead of the syringe to give the medicine
- If your baby spits up medication:
 - Within 15 minutes of giving the medicine, give the dose again and stay on schedule.
 - o More than 15 minutes after giving the medicine, do not give the dose again.
 - If you forget a dose, give the missed dose as soon as you remember. The next dose will be 12 hours later – this becomes your new timing schedule.
- Breast/chestfeeding is NOT recommended, if you would like more information call your HIV Care Provider.
 - HIV can be passed through breast/chestmilk even if mom/birthing parent is on HIV medicines and has an undetectable viral load
 - Free formula is available through the Saskatchewan Formula Program or NIHB

** ATTEND ALL MEDICAL APPOINTMENTS FOR BABY AND GET ALL BLOOD WORK**

- Appointments will be booked for you and may be by phone or in person.
- Tests for HIV and to monitor baby's health will be ordered by the doctor.
